

Mothing in Montgomeryshire – 2025 Annual Report

New Species Recorded in Montgomeryshire During 2025

In general, 2025 was a better year for moths than 2024, with many recorders getting better numbers in their traps, or out doing field work. The species count and quantities were generally better across the whole of the UK. Montgomeryshire did manage to record 9 New County Records (NCR's), with two macro and seven micro species added to our county lists, so in general the year was pretty good.

The details of the 7 new micro species recorded are: Old bf log number in brackets: -

20.007 (409b) *Argyresthia cupressella*, 29-06-25. (SAL), This North American species first arrived on our shores in 1997 and although still local, has been spreading north and west since then. It was recorded at Cemmaes, in the far west of the county.

28.008 (624a) *Metalampra italica*. 11th June 2025 and 11/08/25, Llandyssil (MEG). A new county record for Montgomeryshire and is also only the second record for North Wales. This is a very local species, first recorded in 2003 in the UK, previously only known in Italy

35.064 (0734) *Argolampotes micella*, 8th July 2025 Commins Coch (PRW). NCR for Montgomeryshire and a first for North Wales. This very local species has up until now only been found in south-west England and coastal areas of south Wales.



TACHYSTOLA ACROXANTHA

37.039 (0528) *Coleophora hemerobiella*. 12th July 2025 Aberhafesp (MB4). This species is locally distributed mostly in the south-east of England. Therefore, it was big surprise when it turned up in Montgomeryshire at Aberhafesp and it is the first record for Wales.

49.296 (1179) *Notocelia incarnatana*. 29th July 2025 Cemmaes (SAL). NCR for Montgomeryshire. A very local species, mainly found in coastal areas of England and Wales.

62.006 (1425) *Galleria mellonella* Wax Moth. 13th August 2025 Ardleen (PT). NCR for Montgomeryshire and the 9th record for North Wales. A common species over much of England and South Wales, but seemingly uncommon or absent from other areas of the UK.

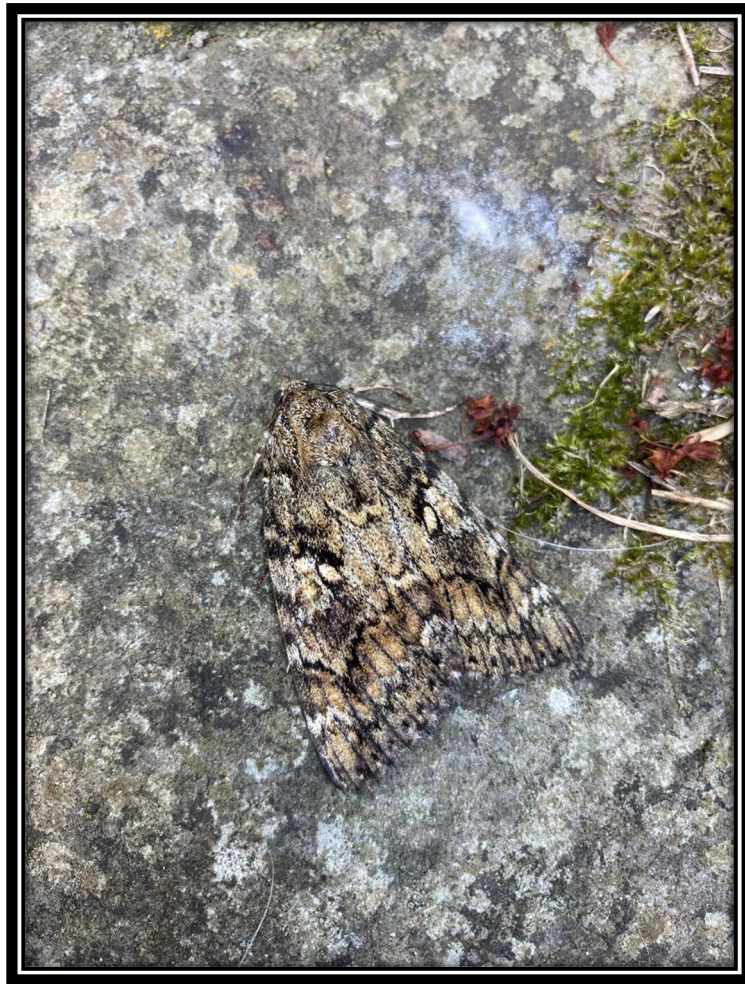
63.044 (1403) *Diasemiopsis ramburialis*. 29th June 2025 Cemmaes (SAL). This is a scarce migrant species found in the UK, mainly in south coast counties of England. It was recorded at Cemmaes and is only the 3rd record for North Wales

The details of the 2 new macro species recorded are: Old bf log number in brackets: -

72.081 (2455) *Catocala sponsa* Dark Crimson Underwing. 19th Aug 2025 Tylwch (DH). This species has up until recent times been restricted to a few known sites in the far south of England, therefore it was a great surprise for it turn up in Montgomeryshire. A first for Wales, a remarkable NCR, probably a migrant wanderer.

73.196 (2259a) *Conistra rubiginosa*, Black-spotted Chestnut. 16th Dec 2025 Ardleen (WT). This resident colonist has been moving steadily westwards across the UK from Kent, where it was first recorded in 2011 and it was only a matter of time before it reached us. It's quite a striking species and one which many of us will record in due course.

End of Year Statistics for 2025

Summary of end of year statistics; figures in parenthesis show 2024 totals.

- The number of macro records for 2025 were up by over 3,800 records on the previous year. Both macro and micro records were well up over the previous year's figures.
- The breakdown is: - we added a total of 17,393 (13,614) of records to our database. The share between macro and micro records was; 15,086 (11,717) macro and 2,607 (1,924) micros. We now have 311,332 (296,244) macro records and 51271 (48,664) micro records, giving us a grand total of 362,603 (344,908) records in the database.
- Total number of species now held in our database is 548 (546) macro species and 692 (685) micro species giving us a total of 1240 species recorded in the county.

- Total species recorded in 2025 was 416 (398) macro species, 18 species up on 2024, so very good and 250 (256) micro species, 6 species own on 2024, which isn't bad either. Giving a grand total of 666 (649) species for the year – an overall rise of 17 species on the previous year, which is an excellent addition.

The following charts show the 2025 rank of the top five species in various categories recorded in Montgomeryshire.

Please note the previous year's rank/records are shown in parenthesis and a dash indicates that the species was not in top five the previous year. As usual I have separated the macro (left hand charts) from the micro moths (right hand charts) so that you get a better overview of how both groups are doing.

The two charts below show the top five most numerous species 'by records' for the year.

In the macro moths the Flame Shoulder has moved to top spot. The Large Yellow Underwing has remained in 2nd place and the Green Carpet moved into 5th place. Again, none of the spring species did well in this category.

In the micros the top five species were all once again *Pyrilidae*, with *Anania hortulata* holding onto the top spot. There were three new entries: *Agriphila tristella* in at 3rd. place; *Chrysoteuchia culmella* in at 4th place and *Udea ferrugalis* in at number 5.

The next two charts show the top five species by the 'quantities' recorded.

Quantities recorded for the macro moths were in general better when viewed against 2024 figures, with a bit of movement in the top five. Large Yellow Underwing held onto 1st place and the Flame Shoulder moved into 2nd place, the latter not being in the top five at all the previous year. One surprising addition was the Setaceous Hebrew Character moving into 5th. place.

Agriphila tristella moved into first place, in general it was a much better year for some species of grass moths. Moving into the top five places was *Eudonia mercurella* into 4th. and *Patania ruralis* moved up from 5th to 2nd place.

The last two charts show the top five all-time records in our database.

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The top five species in our database 'by records' for Macro species were unchanged. However, there was a bit of movement in the micro species. *Eudonia lacustrata* 2nd and *Scoparia ambigualis* 3rd swapped places, while Anania hortulata moved into 5th place.

MMG Fundraising

2025 has been a great year for the MMG as we were chosen to receive some funding of just over £2500 from 'Local Places for Nature' (LPfN). This grant will enable us to continue with the popular wild flower seed mix distribution this year and purchase extra equipment, expanding the engagement activities of the moth group. We will be purchasing three state-of-the-art Lepi LED traps which are 12v, all-weather and ultra lightweight. They will be ideal for engaging people in remote areas for overnight trapping in inhospitable, under-recorded environments such as mountains and moorland. We are also purchasing more Clearwing pheromone lures to build on the successes of last year's recording.

I would like to thank all those who have helped to put some funds in our kitty during the last year via donations and 'Easyfundraising'. Running a website, updating reference books and the upkeep of the mothing kit has to be paid from somewhere, so every bit of funding raised is very much appreciated.
